
THE BITTER SPRINGS 'Everyone's Cup Of Tea' Harvey Records HARVEYCD004 (2xCD) (69m00s) (71m42s) (UK) Feb 2013 [www.thebittersprings.com]: After 7 years of working on this (their first album since 2006s 'That Sentimental Slush'), and in the interim delivering a number of EPs to keep us happy (with many of those tracks on the 2 CDs presented here), then it ends up as a very long work of 26 tracks & almost 141 minutes. CD1: Kicks off to a great start via 'A Better Offer' which grabs the attention via crunching distorted organ & guitar plus Simon's dead pan vocals "Together forever". 'Cruel Britannia' doesn't quite do the same & reminds more of an early 80s pub rock'n'roll track. Next up 'My Life As A Dog In A Pigsty' is a solid cutting social commentary & back to excellence "They would never expect to be happy". 'Hail The Lifeboat Man' has interesting touches & turns out as a great catchy sing-along "Hey this one's still alive". Then the wonderful discoish 'And Even Now', the original 'Harry Hippie', the atmospheric 'The Mollycoddled Laughs'. 8th cup 'The Life & Not Entirely Uneventful Times Of A McAlpine Fusilier' is quite brilliant & a folk banjo affair with as always cutting lyrics "and the past is coming up to meet my shovel going down...just me against the ground" and probably my favourite here (please BBC Radio get them in for a live session & get this up on youtube). 'TV Tears' is excellent as also 'Gary Glitter Fan Convention', then 'Don't Write A Song' with a fine additional emotional vocal by one Johny Brown, 'The Wounded' & finally 'Your Leather Boots' continues the magic. CD2 is subtitled 'The Bitter Springs Destroyed My Life' and 'Powerless (Pt 1)' is a strong opener before moving onto one of those already released EP tracks 'Sirens Everyday' with more wonderful melancholy bitter twistedness. Then the harmonica wailfully sounds to introduce a very beautiful gentle acoustic 'Our Ghosts' (reminds of BS's 1995 'Girl On A Mountain Bike'). 'Purely Medicinal' is 60s blues ala Buffalo Springfield/Fleetwood Mac but is also really nothing like them. 'Powerless (Pt 2)' follows & then another EP track 'Free To Kill Again'. 7th the long chill vibe 'Undercover' works really well as also does 'The Hospital Run' & 'Powerless (Pts 3&4)' and forms a strong section. 10th track 'White Noise (And Even Now)' is slow beautiful & emotional. 'TV Unplugged' with acoustic guitar is an unplugged version of 'TV Tears'. The wonderful hypnotic 11 minute long 'Snowflakes In June' with then 'A Temporary Hush' bringing this huge work to a close. Initially I thought that CD1 was the better but then with repeated plays CD2 seems perhaps a slightly

more cohesive & stronger outing. If you find it too long then you can always choose your favourites & make a 65 minute album & so have foolishly tried to select just 10 numbers. CD1: 1,3,4,8,9,10 & CD2: 2,7,10,12 but that has meant leaving many good ones out. Bitter sardonic social commentary observations everyday life, with a dose of cheeky spring fun, poignant lyrics & indie backing. (81/2/10)
